


utdoor Activities!

Ask anybody who's somebody and they'll tell you that this year's Book Swap was a resounding success. It took place on Friday 10 February. The Book Swap expanded this year from P3-P6 to P1-Sec1. We collected more books and had more book reports written this year than last year.

Here is the Book Swap by the numbers. P2 Faith classroom had the highest book

donation turnout with 18 of 23 students participating (78%). Their class alone collected 54 books. A total of 439 books were collected which is one book per primary and secondary student. In all of primary and secondary, 37% of students participated. Hopefully next year we can have a 50% participation rate.

There were 6 First Prize winners this year. Each student by Patrick Myers

received 500 Baht from Asia Books after reading their Book Swap selections and writing a book report about it. There were also 9 Second Prize winners (300 Baht) and 12 Third Prize winners (200 Baht).

Thanks for everyone's participation this year. We'll see you next year at the swap.





1. K2 的"击鼓传花"、"踩高跷"活动:



击鼓传花,又称传彩球,源于中国唐代,是老少皆宜的游戏。不只是借着鼓声营造紧张兴奋的气氛,更是训练孩子们耳手协调能力的好方法。

踩高跷,是中国民间盛行的群众性技艺表演。孩子们踩高跷时动作滑稽可爱、活泼有趣,引来现场一阵阵的笑声。



吹画是中国画的一种。吹画时先将墨汁或颜料滴在纸上,然后用吸管向不同方向吹,使之流动来代替画笔作画,画面往往造型奇特,是培养孩子艺术创造力的好方法。

"福"是一个吉祥的字,贴福字也成为春节的传统活动。孩子们在写好的"福"字框里涂上墨汁,寄托了他们对幸福生活的向往,也是对美好未来的祝愿。



过年是中国人的大事。过年之前要做很多准备,要买很多东西,吃的、用的、穿的、挂的…就叫"办年货"。活动时老师们把能想到的年货物品散放在柜子里,让孩子们按老师所说的年货名称去找出来,孩子们在兴奋地寻找年货的过程中,学习了中文。

脸谱是中国传统戏剧艺术的精髓。孩子们在给脸谱涂色的过程中,学习了中国文化、也提高了对中国艺术的欣赏能力。














The Secondary Students learned History, Geography and Thai Culture outside the four corners of their room on the 16th to 18th of February to Chiang Rai Residential.

วันใหว้ครู






