The topics selected were intuitively designed to meet specific needs to encourage engagement of the parents at home to support and sustain what the school is building with students in their time while inside the classrooms. Topics which are namely, Positive Parenting (Term One), Understanding Child Development by Age (Term Two), and Forging Harmony to Share Common Goals (Term Three) were presented in a form of a workshop wherein parents are given chance to participate in activities and discussions.

Each of these three topics were presented by the highly experienced and qualified members of the school staff with the exemption of Ms. Zoe Chan who has her Master's in Counselling from Monash University and a member of the Australian Counselling Association. The other topics were presented by Ms. Ghea Tenchavez, PhD, Ms. Nathalie Pueblos, Ms. Maria Eulaiza Raya, Ms. Kotchaporn Pornsonti, Ms. Nathareen Preechadej, Mr. Wachiravit Karuensatit and Mr. Dechathorn Karuensatit.

The participants in these workshops are parents with children from the different divisions of the school, explaining why Management Team members from the different divisions were tasked to present. Their expertise extensive understanding of child development as well as teaching pedagogies come handv in imparting useful information, approaches, and

techniques in handling certain situations occurring while children are growing. Situations emerging from physical changes, social relationship, digital or cyber exposure, unmanaged emotions, and living conditions of the children require specific approach to cushion the impact to the child as they develop into a certain age.

Children needs a cohesive community as their support system. The family and the school are their immediate environments that occupy their time while growing up. Without an appropriate amount of collaboration, understanding and cooperation, a certain aspect of the child's growth will be sacrificed.

I find joy in simplicity. Simple tasks, straightforward instructions, and easy assignments are my favourites. The main selling points: they are easy to follow and hard to mess up. Despite their monotony and repetition, I prefer them over the tangled mess of complex tasks, which are hard to understand and even easier to mess up.

Before I entered TSIS almost six years ago, I was, for lack of a better word, unwise, unreliable, and impractical in my actions. I had a knack for making bad decisions and was frequently called out for it by my teachers and my grandpa, who was a stickler for even the smallest details, like the direction a spoon should face in a bowl of soup. Recognising and fearing my unreliability, I had since then preferred to stick to usual things - avidly avoiding large tasks, responsibilities, or events and ceremonies. When my mum announced my brother's and my transfer to this 'Thai-Singapore International School', I became nervous. Neurotic. Anxious. Thinking of the school, I imagined a 10-storey building with ash-coloured walls, a spiraling column of stairs, and stately students walking through the corridors. The thought scared me.

However, TSIS was not what I expected. Contrary to the towering cuboid of a school, TSIS was arranged more in multiple colourful blocks decorated heavily with lush green trees. It had a lighter, more open atmosphere. Still, I continued to avoid activities, except for ones I had to participate in, like Wai Kru ceremonies, or ones

I genuinely enjoyed, like building a piñata in P3. But everything changed when secondary school began.

Secondary 1 was very different. Before the shuffling of classes, I was certain that I would hang out with the same friends I had in primary. However, it very quickly became clear that I would not see them often and I was forced to make friends with new people. Both mandatory and extracurricular activities came flooding in like high tide - MUN, large student-led performances, sports varsities are just a few examples. Nearly all students around me participated in some sort of activity or school organisation. Yet I stuck to the regular school curriculum, though I was certainly curious about all the new activities.



Secondary 2 changed everything. On a Monday afternoon, after school in Term 1, I ran back to the classroom to retrieve my iPad which I had forgotten. On the way back, I noticed some of my friends in a box-filled room at the end of the 1st floor hallway. Curious, I went over to them and learned that they were sorting donated items. I figured I had nothing to do at home, so I helped them sort the items (barely), which was a nice change of pace. Walking out of that place, I expected to just be forgotten by the next day.

In Term 2, I received a surprising invitation to the Office of Secondary Student Affairs on the 7th floor during break time. It turned out my friend Mild, who is part of the OSSA Research Group interns, had recommended me for the intern group. There, I met with Miss Amai, who briefly explained her research group's work, along with their progress and predicament. Then, I was faced with a choice: join the constantly busy and enthusiastic interns, or decline and go about my own business. Despite my disdain for regular schoolwork, I reluctantly accepted. Later that day, as I was walking to the front building, I bumped into Miss Amai again. I took the opportunity to inquire about the research work, only to find myself "persuaded" into helping her and some MUN-Al guild officers set up a Write For Rights booth. Given the choice between setting up a booth and doing Chinese homework (which I still completed when I got home), I agreed to help. Towards the end of the day, I was offered membership in the MUN-Al guild. and without hesitation, I accepted. This decision led me to participate in a MUN conference and assist in facilitating the ESports Interhouse Tournaments as an MC and as one of the organisers, among other school activities in which I suddenly found myself actively involved.

At every step of the way, I doubted my reliability and the value I could offer. However, I learned that someone's past characteristics should not dictate their present actions. When an opportunity is presented, it signifies that others recognize the potential in you, which we should all embrace.
